stripers attacking the schools of baby river herring and shad preparing to migrate down to the ocean

We hope to see you at Fletcher's Cove before the doors close in late October. Ray's Zinnias are still in their glory and many wildflowers and strange critters are there to be seen. Rentals will continue on a day-to-day basis according to weather and water conditions.
